#### A Message From Pastor Sellers

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

An old saying states "April showers bring May flowers." This is a fairly straightforward statement about traditional spring weather patterns and peak bloom times, but it is also a helpful metaphor. Sometimes a less than pleasant time lays the necessary groundwork for a time that is more joyful and fruitful. Holy Week, with the procession into Jerusalem followed by Jesus' arrest, unfair trial, humiliation, beating and crucifixion, as terrible as it was, was the necessary precursors to Jesus' glorious resurrection. The depth of God's love that was revealed on the cross was not apparent to the disciples at the time it occurred. It could only be understood in hindsight. During the events of the arrest and crucifixion I am sure the followers of Jesus felt only anguish, despair and panic. They felt Jesus was abandoning them. They were convinced Jesus was the Messiah and would lead them to victory, but once he was arrested being associated with Jesus put them in danger. They feared for their lives. God's love was the last thing they would have thought was being revealed to them as Jesus hung on the cross and laid in the tomb.


On reflection, looking back at the events of Holy Week from

beyond Easter Sunday, the disciples could reexamine what took place, and understand all of Jesus' teaching anew. They saw with what great love Jesus had willingly endured suffering and humiliation for their sake. Only after he greeted them with peace, rather than demanding retribution, did they recognize the power of God's forgiveness. Only in retrospect could they comprehend they had never been abandoned in the first place. The new understanding they discovered, after the shock of the resurrection appearances,

allowed them to truly, profoundly, understand the good news. It was this new understanding that inspired and equipped them to pursue their mission to share the good news of God's love with all the world.

In the past months our congregation has wrestled with some deep and difficult questions. People have felt very strongly about the issues at hand. Relationships have been strained, and trust has been bruised between some of our members. The struggle we have been going through is not comparable with the state of the disciples during the passion of Jesus, by any means. Yet, there is wisdom in recognizing that although we experienced events in real time, like the disciples, the richest lessons we can learn from our experiences are discovered by reflecting on them after the fact.

At a tense congregational meeting in mid-March a question about the ministry of the congregation was decided by a clear up and down vote. When asked whether we would permit homeless people to remain on church property while they pursued permanent housing the clear answer was no, but it was a split decision. For many members of the congregation it may seem best to put this difficult and painful experience behind us as quickly as possible.

I understand that urge. But I also know there are some important things we might learn if we take the time to truly reflect. Some legitimate areas for inquiry are: How did the issue become so big and divisive in the first place? What can we do as a congregation, and as individual members, to prevent other issues from becoming so challenging to address in the future? Is there a better way for us to work through difficult issues going forward? Taking the time and making the effort to reflect may allow us to take something of value from the pain we have experienced together.

At the recommendation of the Mutual Ministry team, the Church Council approved the engagement of a consultant, Dr. Dolores Littleton from Penn Council on Relationships, to work with the staff, the Church Council, and the Mutual Ministry team to reflect and learn from recent events. This decision was made before the congregational meeting was held, because it was clear even then, regardless of the outcome, many people would not be satisfied with the vote and healing would be necessary. Either a yes or no decision would result in some people being hurt and unhappy. The Mutual Ministry team and Church Council saw the forecast coming. April showers, indeed.

This congregation is in an important season. We can avert our eyes, swallow our discomfort, and just try to get through it, or we can trust that indeed, "all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28). Even this season. I pray Dr. Littleton will be able to help us learn from our experience. It is my sincere hope we will not let our pain and struggle go to waste, but will find the faith to believe God will help us as we strive to heal and grow stronger as a congregation by learning what we can about getting to and maintaining peace.

To this end, members of the congregation are invited to join in a discussion of the book **"The Peacemaker" by Ken Sande.** The book is available to order on-line at Amazon or through other book sellers. The Church Council and Mutual Ministry team have already been using this book. The book is in four sections of three chapters each. Beginning on April 14 a discussion of the book will be available for any interested members on a series of Sunday evenings. We will offer a discussion covering one section (three chapters) at each meeting in a hybrid format so anyone can participate in person or on Zoom from 7 pm. The schedule will be:

Sunday, April 14 - Glorify God,

Sunday, May 5 - Get the Log Out of Your Own Eye

Sunday, June 9 - Gently Restore, and

Sunday, June 30 - Go and Be Reconciled

In person we will meet in the Annex. Zoom links will be included in the Weekly News and Notes. In this Easter season, there is a flowering of hope because Christ has created peace with God. May we reflect the intention of God by growing in our understanding and pursuing peace within ourselves and with one another.

## Youth News

#### **Created to Be FREE**

In the February and March Clarions, we explored the themes of Created to be Brave and Created to be Authentic. Our third installment of the ELCA Youth Gathering Theme is Created to be Free. The word FREE is a loaded word, isn't it? It takes on a certain meaning depending on the context. There's freedom in the sense of having a voice, your ability to determine your government, your ability to pursue your life goals, your ability to espouse to a certain religion (or

not) and your ability to make your own decisions when it comes to career, family and recreational pursuits. The beauty of being free is not only can all of those be determined by you, but also, you can rank them to the level of importance as you see fit.

Sounds great. But it also sounds messy. When does my pursuit of freedom impede with someone else's? What if our choices conflict with one another?

When I taught a lesson on this in Sunday School, we talked about freedom in the context of what is written in the Bill of Rights; those freedoms that are "guaranteed" by our government: freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom to dissent to government, freedom to peaceably assemble, a free press. There are lots of other "rights" given in the Bill of Rights, but these freedoms are listed first thing, in the first amendment. But then we talked about something FDR said in his historic 1941 state of the union address, when he gave the whole idea of being FREE a new spin. He talked about the four universal freedoms that all humans should possess (not just Americans). FDR stated that those four universal freedoms were: the freedom of speech, the freedom of religion, the freedom from want, and the freedom from fear. Woah, those last two are very interesting aren't they? Especially his use of the word "from" rather than "of". How do you regulate the absence of something? And even if you could, how do you qualify it, since everyone has a different idea of what want and fear are?

Obviously, FDR was talking about these four universal freedoms because the world was facing Nazi Germany and the rise of a dictatorship that was endangering these freedoms for certain sects of people. So perhaps his words were just meant to be highlighting the dangers ahead, or perhaps they were meant to be simply inspirational. Either way, the concept of a freedom being the absence of something is interesting and muddies the water a bit. How do you define the freedom FROM want? What is a want? I feel like perhaps he meant that all humans have the right to have their basic needs met, but then why didn't he say, "freedom from need?" And even then, even if that's what he meant, it's problematic because depending upon the societal norms; one person's needs could be vastly different than another's. Hmmm. And then there is the idea of freedom from fear. From ALL fear? How would that even be possible? And again, how do we separate one person's freedom from another's when they clash? For example, what if something you say (which you have a right to do) causes fear in someone else? What if your pursuit of financial gain impacts another's freedom from want? You can see how difficult and complicated this conversation can be.

Ok, so after this quagmire of thought, let me change the subject to Jazz music. The Gathering is in New Orleans, after all, and I promise that I will circle back. I would say that Jazz can be considered one of the most "free" forms of music, right? There are improvisations and changes to the length of the songs and a variety of instruments used. When I played in the Jazz Band in middle school, I was exceedingly uncomfortable with the free style nature of the whole thing...I dreaded when the band director would point his baton at me for a solo...I had no idea what to do. I preferred to have my notes laid out on the page for me to follow. But as an adult, as I look at it, I realize that Jazz is not so loosey-goosey as all that. It still has a time signature, everyone still plays in the same key and they all watch the band director so they can stay together. And even within each solo, there are guardrails provided by the rest of the band so that the soloist gets a feel for where to go and when to stop. There are rules to Jazz music that all the musicians have to follow in order for the music to have a cohesive, pleasing sound. If there were NO rules, it would be chaos...sort of like the sound an orchestra makes when they are all warming up at the same time.

That got me to thinking back about those universal freedoms. It seems even though we all have a right to those things, we also have to work within a framework of rules and regulations so as not to impede or hurt each other. Society and the government work together to decide what is expected of its citizens and what behaviors are outside of the framework.

And then THAT thought got me thinking about faith. There it is, you knew I was going to get there eventually, right? It occurred to me the freedom our faith provides is analogous to Jazz music. There are certain rules that guide us along (the ten commandments, our creed, the teachings and example of Jesus), but yet within that framework, each and every one of us is FREE to have a specific, personal relationship with God and to worship him how we feel appropriate. We are free to improvise and go out on our own for a solo, but the guardrails are there to catch us when we go off course. True freedom comes with the knowledge that God is God and we are not, and as free as we are, we are still guided by his loving mercy and are provided pathways to follow that will lead to compassion and contentment.

So, I challenged the youth that are going to New Orleans to listen for the Jazz music. And when they hear it, they remember they are FREE to pursue a relationship with God however they see fit and they are encouraged to play their own instrument in a solo written by them, and inspired by their creator. What wonderful music that freedom will create!

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#### Treasurer's report Feb 24

February giving looks a little more normal. Total general fund (GF) receipts are over budget by \$2,436 thanks to envelope giving. Envelope giving for February 2024 is \$800 over February 2023.

YTD GF total receipts are under budget due to lower January giving, keeping in mind the Dec -Jan total receipts from last year compared to this year was \$5,566, per my January notes. As a result of January 2024, the Previous Year Comparison reflects a variance of \$25,291 less

receipts than 2023.

General fund expenses for February are under budget by \$1,806.

YTD expenses are under budget \$764.

The YTD Ordinary net loss of \$18,074 versus a budgeted loss of \$11,973 leaves a variance of \$6,091, again this is primarily due to lower than usual January receipts.

2024 YTD GF expenses of \$72,152 are \$8,993 higher than YTD February 2023. Snow removal this winter of \$5,655, as well as advertising and the purchase of new paraments this January make up the variance.

Shepherd Shelf (SS) receipts for February are \$200 under budget and expenses are \$624 under budget, a net of \$424 variance ahead of budget.

SS receipts YTD are over budget \$1,750, expenses over budget \$469, a net variance of \$1,282 ahead of budget.

SS net income is \$665 behind our YTD income comparison to 2023.

Building Fund receipts for February are \$8,423 ahead of budget, YTD ahead of budget by \$6,217. YTD comparison of Building Fund receipts are just \$300 ahead of 2023 YTD.

#### Shepherd's Shelf Summary

In February the Shepherd's Shelf served our greater community. There were 128 visits from eligible households. 7 new households were added consisting of 22 individuals (14 adults, 6 children and 2 seniors). Diapers were distributed 23 times and wipes 15 times. Feminine hygiene products were distributed 51 times. Volunteers from CLC and from the community logged 240 hours. The estimated value of distributions to our clients for the month is \$30,720.
