A Message From Pastor Sellers

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Happy New Year! Welcome to 2024!

Have you ever stopped to wonder why it is 2024 and not some other number? There is actually some interesting history behind this date.

Before the 6th century the year was determined from the date that Diocletian became the emperor of Rome. Diocletian was elevated to emperor at a time of decline and upheaval when the collapse of the empire was a real possibility. He was famous mostly for restoring stability through administrative reforms. When he ascended to the role of emperor, he realized that the empire was far too big to be effectively administered by one person, so he appointed three "co-rulers" who administered the empire with him. He took power away from the senate, and created smaller administrative districts that both increased efficiency, and decreased the power of individuals, so that his centralized power

was actually consolidated through division. He might be considered the father of bureaucracy, but his efforts brought the Roman Empire back from the brink. Before Diocletian time was measured from the founding of Rome, but his reforms were so transformative that he was considered to have begun a new era in the empire, and the clock was reset to begin with his ascendancy to the role of Emperor. The problem was that Diocletian was also famous for beginning the longest, bloodiest and most brutal persecution of

Christians in history. Diocletian was a devotee of the Roman cult and proclaimed himself and his co-rulers as offspring of the gods. He issued several edicts that resulted in the killing and imprisonment of Christians and the burning of churches and scriptures. The intent was to entirely wipe out Christianity from the face of the earth. Rather than doing away with Christianity, however, the blood of the martyrs inspired an even deeper devotion to Christ. Not long after his reign Constantine came to power, and six years after his ascendancy, Constantine attributed a military victory to the Christian God, converted, and became the first Christian Emperor.

More than a century later, a monk named Dionysius Exiguus, of Scythia Minor, wanting to do away with the memory of Diocletian, decided to count the years differently. He believed that the real hinge of history was not the formation of the Roman Empire or the ascendancy of the father of bureaucracy, but the moment that God entered his creation in the person of Christ. In A.D. 525 he introduced the A.D. (which is an abbreviation of "anno domini" or "year of our Lord") system, counting the years, to the best of his ability, since the birth of Christ. Scholars have disputed the calculations of Dionysius, and most concur that he was probably about four years off, but his intention to measure time from the birth of Jesus has determined the way the year is expressed around the world to this day. The use of C.E. to mean "common era" has become popular in recent years – but the number itself is still tied to the occurrence of God's incarnation in the person of Jesus.

In the early Christian scriptures two different words are used to refer to time. "Chronos" is used to reference clock or calendar time. "Kairos" refers to measuring time through meaningful events. I don't have a great head for dates. For many years I thought that I was terrible at history, until I recognized that study of history was not about memorizing the dates, but knowing the stories of what happened. I find sometimes that I use "Kairos" time to try to remember "Chronos". Was it before or after the American Revolution? Who was president at the time? Did that happen before or after our last child

was born? Was it before or after 9/11? But in Dionysius' expression of the year that we are living in, Kairos and Chronos meet.

In fact, the more that we recognize God's presence in all times and places, the more we discover that Kairos and Chronos are always at play. Every moment of every day is rich with possibility for the love and power of God to be expressed. As Christmas draws to a close we enter the season of "Epiphany" or the time of light – in which the presence of God is revealed more and more. It grows from a single star in the vastness of the heavens noticed by a handful of attentive astronomers to the blinding light of the transfiguration when the identity of Christ is made known on a mountain top.

2024 is likely to be identified for many things. It is an American presidential election year. There are sure to be technological breakthroughs, natural and human contrived disasters, acts of heroism and villainy. Headlines will happen every day. But I pray that we will come to recognize 2024 as "the year of our Lord". A year when the recognition of God's presence and love for each person becomes more and more clear, as we live into God's call to let love make a difference in how we use the precious years, days, hours and moments that are given to us.

Happy New Year dear friends. May we receive it with gratitude and use its days wisely. Blessings,





Church Council Meeting

Council Highlights Meeting, December 12

• CLC Treasurer Report: Brian Sharkey & Chris Martin: note that Brian did not have the building fund budget ready currently. He will have the budget prepared for the January 9, 2024, council meeting so the motion will be made at that time. (Tabled)

A motion was made to present the Operating

Budget to the congregation, seconded and motion passed. A motion was made to present the Shepherd's Shelf Budget to the congregation, seconded and motion passed.

Council help is needed in recruiting people for Faith Talk videos. Council members will each ask two people.

• The Welcoming Team, ably served by Paula Morris, is now leaderless although Paula is still willing to serve on the team, and we need to consider (especially in this year of witness) who might replace her. Paula will be recognized and honored at the January congregational meeting.

• A potential "Witnessing through Service Event", hosting a meal packaging event through Rise Against Hunger (we would pack 10,000 meals). Stewardship sponsored this once before. This might be something that members would be open to inviting unchurched friends to attend. These events are however expensive (in the area of \$4,200) and it is not budgeted but there are sufficient gains in our investments that we might fund this from the endowments in 2024. Council members mentioned Lenten offerings as another potential source of funds. Having the event on an early weekend in April, 2024 was mentioned, possibly Youth Sunday on the 14th. •

The work of the Homelessness Task Force is not complete, so we need to imagine what it looks like going forward.

• The Mutual Ministry Team also wants to work on the dynamics that led to tension in the congregation with a book study of "The Peacemaker"

• Cluster Mardi Gras Pancake Dinner is scheduled for February 13, our February meeting date will be changed to Monday February 12.

Cemetery Ministry Team - Brooke sent the budget to the Finance Team. The team will come up with goals at the next meeting. Cemetery clean-up was done after Thanksgiving.

• Welcome Ministry Team - had a successful Welcome Walk and would like to ask Rochelle Dodge to join as a team member.

• Property Ministry Team - Team is working with the Welcome Ministry Team on a Welcoming Window Garden. - Almost \$2,000 has been donated towards the new chairs. The Team is working to make the annex more comfortable for those who work and meet there. - Pastor would like to set up

the screen in the opposite corner of the annex but both outlets need to work. Gerri said she would convey this to the team. - The team would like to fix the overhead light that flickers.

Shepherd's Shelf Ministry Team - Better outdoor lighting is requested by the Shepherd's Shelf.
They would like the Property Team to replace the 2 fixtures with new lighting that has an automatic sensor. Council noted that three bids are not required for this if the total amount is under \$3000.
New Business: 1. Staff Gifts – Council discussion & approval - There are nine staff members, and it was recommended to give each a \$100 check for \$900 total. Motion made, seconded and passed.
2. Gerri Test – Needs to switch as team ministry liaison for Property Team Ministry with another council member - Gerri let the Council know that she will be moving in February and while still serving her term on Council by attending meetings via Zoom, she would like to switch off the very active Property Team.

3. Steph Sharkey scheduled deescalating training on 1/11/24 at 6:30 pm. She plans to invite any Shepherd's Shelf volunteers as well as church members who would like to attend. If there are any questions, please text Steph.

4. Welcome Ministry Team is asking for a \$500 increase in their budget for 2024, based on a number of new residents discovered at the 12/9/23 Welcome Walk. -Brian and Chris said this was already approved as part of the new budget.

5. Blaret Fund – Property Team to get this moving forward in order to provide ADA ramps from the sanctuary. This money is part of a trust administered by Tom Caldwell, which is to provide for the needs of senior church members.

A New 2024

With a new year, and a new calendar filled with possibilities, many people make New Year's resolutions; changes to their lives that may make a meaningful impact. Some might make changes that improve their health, or they may quit a bad habit, or add activities to increase their joy, or work to deepen relationships. Of course, the old joke is that by mid-January, most of the resolutions are broken or

forgotten, but once in a while one may stick around for a while or even become a life-long habit. As a member of a gym, it is always a bit frustrating to see all the new members clogging up the machines in January, but it can also be inspirational to witness people making choices to do something to improve their lives. As Christians, we may even incorporate spiritual practices into our resolutions, such as attending church more regularly or praying daily or starting a gratitude journal. Hopefully, those kinds of resolutions are ones that stick for a while!

For me this year, I would like to concentrate on something a little different. I would like to redefine what Christianity is to me. Well, maybe not re-define exactly, but maybe concentrate on getting back to the basics of what we are supposed to be doing as followers of Christ. There has been a ton of unhealthy dialog, disagreements, political agendas and extreme talking points around Christianity the last few years (maybe there always has been and it's just a little more out in the open right now?). I don't know about you, but for me it can actually make me feel uneasy about living my Christian life in full view; like I should tamp down my love of God and maybe not be too obvious in the fact that I am a believer.

So, here is my New Year's Resolution: to live my Christian identity proudly, not in a boasting way, but as an example, and in a way that clearly shows what that title means to me.

Christ-centered. I think sometimes we forget that Christ is the center of our identity. Not the Old Testament, not the old laws, but the new covenant brought to us through Christ's sacrifice...that agreement between God and his people that Jesus is out gateway, our door, our entry into a new relationship and a new eternal life.

Hopeful. Lately I have felt more despair than is good for me, and I think reconnecting with the hope that my Christianity brings is so important to my well-being. After losing a loved one, or facing a difficult situation, there is a light, a hope offered to us by the knowledge that God is in charge and holds our hearts close.

Righteousness. This is a tricky word because I think it can be ill-used to support conflict. Being righteous means being right with God, not right with ourselves or our own agendas. And to me that means to work daily to turn towards God rather than away, in my actions and in my thoughts.

Inconceivable. (You Princess Bride fans will immediately think, "You keep using that word. I don't think it means what you think it means"). Truly, God's love for us IS Inconceivable because it is beyond our human understanding...vast, unending, unconditional love.

Sincere. There's no faking it. Christians are commanded to follow Jesus' example and provide care, help, and concern to as many people as we can. This is an impossible task if we are insincere in our belief that every human being is a child of God.

Try. God does not expect us to be perfect. He only asks that we try our hardest to love him wholeheartedly. He knows we will make mistakes along the way, but as long as we are trying to do better and to be better, he will always offer us grace.


Infant. God chose to come to us in the form of a human infant...an entity that is entirely dependent on others; one that needs human care, nurturing and help. I believe the reason for this is so that we know that God understands us fully. That he became fully human and experienced the human condition. He felt hunger, loss, exhaustion, as well as joy, love and community, so that when we succeed and when we fail, we know that God understands and has compassion for us.

And. I recently talked to the youth Sunday School class about being "Yes, and" people. We are called to say "Yes" to God but then continue with an "and". In other words, to find ways to continue the story...to expand our hearts and minds beyond what we initially thought possible. I think of our

Shepherd's Shelf as a great example of being a "Yes, and" project. It started with God's call to provide for the hungry of our community, and our congregation said "yes" but it is the "and" part that has seen it grow and improve and expand over the last 18 years into something we would have never dreamed of at the beginning.

New. God makes all things new. And through the sacrifice of his son Jesus, we are now made new too. New lives to live through him, with him, and for him. New energy to tackle difficult times. New hearts to expand to others. New ideas to foster community. New opportunities to serve. A new year to commit to those resolutions that will feed our souls, renew our hearts, and bring us closer to God.

The Winter Youth Retreat is This Month! January 12-13



Geodes look plain on the outside but contain beautiful crystals. Create these "rocks" to show how God makes us new on the inside.

What you need:

- Clean cardboard egg carton
- Scissors (and adult help)
- Epsom salt
- Plastic zippered bags (one per color of dye)
- Food coloring
- Glue
- Paintbrush

What you do:

- Cut out the tops and bottoms of all the egg compartments so you can make 6 ball shapes.
- 2. In each bag, put 3 tablespoons of Epsom salt and a drop or two of food coloring. Seal and shake to mix.
- With the paintbrush, spread glue inside two egg-carton halves. Sprinkle a spoonful of Epsom salt into those halves. Then close and shake.
- 4. Open your homemade geode and shake out excess salt.
- 5. Optional: Preserve the crystals with a coat of clear-drying glue.



Shepherd's Shelf Summary

In November the Shepherd's Shelf served our greater community. There were 140 visits from eligible households. Diapers were distributed 28 times and wipes 17 times. Feminine hygiene products were distributed 17 times. Volunteers from CLC and from the community logged 436 hours (increased due to Scouting for Food Event). The estimated value of donations for the month is \$33,600. **Thanksgiving** distributions included: 61 turkeys, 6 pies and 85 \$10 Giant gift cards.

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
