#### A Message From Pastor Sellers

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This month we proceed with Jesus and his disciples into the very heart of our faith. We journey through Lent to Holy Week, which stands as a solemn period of reflection and mourning, marking the final days of Jesus before his crucifixion. It is a time of profound grief and contemplation for Christians, as we walk alongside our Savior in his journey towards Calvary. Yet, from the darkness of the grave, a radiant beacon of hope emerges with the dawn of Easter Sunday, heralding the triumph of life over death, and joy over sorrow.

After Jesus turns over the tables in the temple (March 3), welcomes a disciple who will approach him only under the cover of darkness (March 10), and faces the full impact of what is to come (March 17), Lent transitions into Holy Week.

Palm Sunday, March 24, commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Our palm procession is followed by the passion reading. Although greeted by crowds waving palm branches and hailing him as their Messiah, this jubilant scene swiftly transitions into somber reflection as we recount the events leading to Jesus' betrayal, arrest, and crucifixion.

Fubilation

Although the events from Thursday to Sunday include several gatherings – they are considered one unbroken worship service. The poignant rituals of Maundy Thursday remind us of the depth of Jesus' love and sacrifice. In the washing of feet, Jesus demonstrated that our love for him is best expressed in loving service to one another. He shared the Last Supper with his disciples, offering himself fully to them and for them. As we take the bread (baked by our first communicants) and drink the wine made body and blood by his promise, we also experience the presence of our Savior and the forgiveness of sin. As the altar is laid bare at the end of the service, we come to see the table is similar in form to a casket, and we experience a foreshadowing of the events to come.

Good Friday stands as the pinnacle of Holy Week, a day of unfathomable sorrow and grief. We gather to remember Jesus' crucifixion, meditating on the brutality he endured for the redemption of humanity. The solemn services, marked by the dimming of the sanctuary into darkness as the Passion narrative is read, and the bidding prayer and veneration of the Cross, invite us to enter the sorrow of Christ's suffering and reflect on the weight of sin and the cost of salvation. We exit the sanctuary in profound silence, confronting the reality of death and echoing the disciples' grief and confusion in the aftermath of Christ's crucifixion.

Yet, with the first light of Easter morning, the world is transformed. The tomb is found empty, and the promise of resurrection is fulfilled as Jesus rises victorious over death. The despair of Holy Week gives way to unbridled joy and exultation as we celebrate the triumph of life over death and the fulfillment of God's promise of redemption.


Easter Sunday is a day of jubilant worship and celebration. Christ is Risen! (He is Risen Indeed!) The darkness of Holy Week is replaced by the radiant light of hope, as we rejoice in the irrepressible promise of new life and the assurance of salvation. The hymns of Easter resound with praise and thanksgiving, as Christ's resurrection becomes the cornerstone of our faith and the source of eternal hope.

In the grief of Holy Week and the joy of Easter, we encounter the full spectrum of human experience—the deepest depths of sorrow and the greatest heights of exultation. **Special Congregational Meeting-Sunday, March 17th** There will be a special Congregational Meeting held on Sunday, March 17th at approximately 10:30am. Because of this meeting, there will be ONE (1) service at 9:30am that day. Please make every effort to attend this meeting. **A quorum of 50 voting members is needed.** A zoom link will be provided as the date gets closer. The purpose of this meeting will be the following:

1. Discuss the recently presented motion from the Homelessness Task Force, which outlines protocols for individuals seeking sanctuary on the Church property. This motion has been temporarily approved by the Council, as of the February 12th, 2024 meeting. Documents can be found on the church website or at the usher's station in church.

2. In accordance with the Church Constitution, Chapter 5 (C5.03-g), found below, the Congregation will vote upon whether or not it approves the use of Church property for this purpose.

3. If approved, the Homelessness Task Force will seek guidance from legal counsel, the township (zoning), insurance company and any other relevant entities regarding hosting up to 2 individuals.

Excerpt from Church Constitution: Chapter 5.

POWERS OF THE CONGREGATION

\*C5.03. Only such authority as is delegated to the Congregation Council or other organizational units in this congregation's governing documents is recognized. All remaining authority is retained by the congregation.

The congregation is authorized to:

a. call a pastor as provided in Chapter 9;

b. terminate the call of a pastor as provided in Chapter 9;

c. call or terminate the call of associates in ministry, deaconesses, and diaconal ministers in conformity with the applicable policy of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America;

d. adopt amendments to the constitution, as provided in Chapter 17, and amendments to the bylaws, as specified in Chapter 16, and continuing resolutions, as provided in Chapter 18. e. approve the annual budget;

f. acquire real and personal property by gift, devise, purchase, or other lawful means;

#### g. hold title to and use its property for any and all activities consistent with its purpose;

h. sell, mortgage, lease, transfer, or otherwise dispose of its property by any lawful means; i. elect its Congregation Council and require them to carry out their duties in accordance with the constitution, bylaws; and continuing resolutions; and

j. terminate its relationship with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as provided in Chapter 6.

This means the people of the synod have time to review the mission profile and participate in prayerful conversation under the leadership of the Discernment Team. **Peacemaker Book Discussion**: As a group we discussed our thoughts and feelings around the first chapter of the Peacemaker Book.

**Report from Mutual Ministry Chair (Michelle Martin)** Another emergency meeting was held. Multiple staff members have concerns regarding communication within the office. Multiple staff members have concerns around Mike being in the parking lot. There are concerns about a communication breakdown between staff and Pastor. Mutual ministry is working towards resolving these issues.

Steph Sharkey had a meeting with Pastor that went well but still would like a mediated conversation. Mike's presence is hindering some of the staff completing their jobs. Looking for a third party to help mediate conversations.

#### Michelle will keep Council updated on mediated conversation and next steps. Reports from Homelessness Task Force and Sub-Committees

Property recommendations from Safety Sub-Committee:

Addition of security light (motion sensor) on far side of the Pavilion mounted to face the dumpsters and far portion of the property. Re-paint the directional arrows on the pavement. Adding a remote lock to allow Brooke to buzz folks in from her desk and the archive.

The following recommendations were presented: A Procedure/protocol if someone is found staying overnight on the church property, a Letter of Expectations if someone is to seek sanctuary. Both documents are available at the ushers' station. The letter of Expectations was amended to include "no firearms on property".

Discussion around zoning, legal implications and insurance liability – the Homelessness Task Force will need to discuss and research further.

Discussion around the potential of allowing sanctuary overnight only.

As a group we decided to present this information to the congregation at a special congregational meeting to ensure that the congregation is agreeable to utilize the property in this matter.

## Approval of the protocols that were presented by the Homelessness Task Force on a temporary basis until a Congregational Meeting is held. Rick made the motion and Linda N. Landis seconded the motion. Motion was carried and approved

**Council President Resigns:** Julie Munden informed the Council that she is stepping down from Council President and Council effective immediately.

Vice President Allison Healy will now act as President.

#### Scott Swindells made a motion to approve the fundraising application for Youth Easter Candy Sales on March 10, 17, 24, & 31, to raise funds for the ECLA Youth Gathering; goal \$3000-\$5000 – Pastor Seconded the motion. Motion was carried and approved

Lee Wolfe brought a proposal to provide extra monetary support to the Synodical Mission; a motion to approve use of monies allocated in the Endowment Fund investment earnings. This will need to be deferred to the congregational meeting in June, as the recommended amount exceeds council's authorization. Linda N. Landis made a motion to defer to the June Congregational Meeting. Allison Healy seconded the motion. Motion was carried.

#### Treasurer's Report

Online giving for January 2024 is comparable with December 2023, in line with the budget and just under January 2023 online giving.

On the other hand, envelope giving for January 2024 is less than December 2023 by almost \$34,700, under budget by \$9,471 and less than January 2023 envelope giving by \$26,485. The question here is whether folks gave in December or January for their year-end donation. The total envelope giving for December 2022 plus January 2023 is \$58,658, versus December 2023 plus January 2024 is \$53,092, a difference of \$5,566.

Keep in mind that the budget is evenly divided by 12 months. Envelope giving tends to fluctuate. A reminder here from Brian's budget presentation in January that if we can encourage folks to keep their giving about the same each month the income would have less of the "roller coaster effect" on a graph.

Ordinary expenses are just over budget in January 2024 by \$1,000 and higher than January 2023 by a payment normally made later in the year that was paid in January.

Shepherd Shelf receipts are over budget by \$1,950 .and \$900 more than January 2023 receipts. The expenses are also over budget, pending a grant to offset this expense and comparable to January 2023 with the exception of the expense pending the grant

Building Fund giving is also down in January 2024 as compared to budget by \$2,123, \$1,500 less than December 2023 and \$8,500 less than January 2023. December 2022 plus January 2023 receipts were almost \$16,000. December 2023 plus January 2024 were \$8,000, half as much.

#### Youth News

#### Created to Be...AUTHENTIC.

Last month, I offered an article about the theme of the upcoming ELCA Youth Gathering. The theme for the 2024 Gathering is Created to be Brave, Authentic, Free, Disruptive and Disciples. Last month's article was a deeper dive into the first word, Brave.

This month's word is AUTHENTIC.

Interestingly, the word Authentic was listed as the Webster's Dictionary top word of 2023. When I

taught a Sunday School class about this, we discussed why that might be. We decided that it was likely due to the topic of AI becoming prevalent in 2023 and how in response, people were discussing the authenticity of images, videos and news stories.

Either way, it a pretty cool coincidence that the ELCA has lifted up this particular word to be a core value of our Christian faith...what the Creator has created us to be.

So, what exactly does it mean to be authentic? Webster's definition is "real, true, not false" and "true to one's personality, spirit or character". Also listed was "worthy of acceptance or belief as <u>conforming</u> to or based on fact". In our class discussions, we decided that someone who is authentic is real to themselves; not fake.

So, with those definitions in mind, we discussed why it is important to be an authentic person, and we came up with this answer: because we are all truly unique and it is our differences that gives us strength. When we are truly authentically ourselves, we are stronger. It's an easy connection to make then to our faith. Paul writes in 1Corinthians, Chapter 12 about the church being one body with many members, and how each member has specific gifts and abilities. It is when we work as a whole, integrating each one of those parts, that we mirror our life in Christ; "For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body".

Now, the difficult part is that in being authentically you, you must also allow for others to be authentically themselves. And that is not always easy to do. There are going to be times when we don't recognize another's gifts, or we don't understand their part in the whole, or perhaps we don't value it. But if we don't allow others to be authentic, and we don't embrace others fully, then we risk the result of people diminishing themselves. And, of course there is a Bible passage about that too! Think about Matthew 5:14-16 where it says, "You are the light


of the world...like a city on a hilltop that cannot be hidden. NO one lights a lamp and then puts it under a basket. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where it gives out light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light so shine before others that they might see your good works and glorify the father in heaven." We are not only called to be authentic ourselves and let our own lights shine brightly, but we are also called to let others shine alongside us. When we don't agree or don't see something in the same way, we can feel threatened and want others to hide their own lights under a basket, which to that, God (and the famous Sunday School song) says "No!".

There's a song, more modern than "this Little Gospel Light of Mine", that is about all of this as well. It is called "City on The Hill" by Casting Crowns. I was drawn to it because I know that Christ Lutheran Church is sometimes referred to as the Light on the Hill, because of our location. The song tells about a city on a hill that attracted all sorts of people, and for a while they lived in harmony and worked together, enjoying each other's gifts and talents. But over time, they let their authentic natures go, and demanded others to diminish themselves. "Each one thought they knew better/but they were different by design/instead of standing strong together/they let their differences divide." At the end of the song, the city is darkened and the Creator is standing at the top of the hill with his arms stretched out, saying, "Come home".


Yikes. Doesn't that sound a little familiar right about now? The world seems consumed with division and disagreement. And that is SOOOO not what God wants for us. God made each one of us uniquely different and rejoices in our differences.

When we come together authentically, we are stronger and make a brighter light. We find our home in God's Kingdom and help it to shine. At the end of our Sunday School class, I challenged each youth going to the Gathering with these words; "Christ has called you not just as you are, but BECAUSE of who you are. YOU bring something unique to our community. Your voice, your thoughts, and your ideas and not just wanted, but NEEDED. So, bring your authentic self to the experience". I pray that we all answer this challenge and meet one another at the top of the hill.










### Try this chilly new take on a healthy snack.

- 5. Freeze for two more hours. Enjoy!



#### **March into Peace**

#### Shepherd's Shelf Summary

In January the Shepherd's Shelf served our greater community. There were 147 visits from eligible households. 13 new households were added consisting of 54 individuals (25 adults, 224 children and 5 seniors). Diapers were distributed 24 times and wipes 14 times. Feminine hygiene products were distributed 51 times. Volunteers from CLC and from the community logged 273 hours. The estimated value of distributions to our clients for the month is \$35,280.
